













FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS 2013-2014



The Epiphany School was founded in 1888 to provide the highest quality education to the school-age children of The Epiphany Parish. Today, the school educates approximately 565 students, serving a diverse socio-economic population, who live in all areas of Manhattan and the outer boroughs. We remain committed to education of the highest quality and are guided by our mission: to educate the whole child spiritually, intellectually, socially, emotionally and physically. Fundamental to this mission is developing children with a strong moral and ethical character who will contribute to society in meaningful ways.

he number of Catholic schools is dwindling.
There were approximately 5.25 million
students enrolled in Catholic schools
nationwide in 1960. Today, that number has fallen to
approximately 2 million children. In the last decade,
1,755 Catholic schools were closed or consolidated;
New York City alone saw 27 Catholic schools close
their doors after the 2011 school year. The reasons for
the loss of these schools include lower enrollment,
less financial support from the Church, fewer clergy
members available to serve in unpaid positions, and
quite simply, tuition that is too expensive for working
families in today's economic climate.

The Epiphany School, though fiscally sound as compared to other Catholic schools in the area and nationwide, wanted to ensure its future. To sustain its educational excellence and to keep tuition at an affordable level, The Epiphany School Foundation was established in 1999 to raise funds for the school. This tax-exempt, charitable foundation was founded to enhance the children's educational experience and the faculty's teaching environment. These goals have been achieved over the years by funding programs that the school cannot cover through tuition alone. The Foundation remains dedicated to promoting growth and innovation through these programs.
